Library Director retires after 41 years of service

Library Director Lynn O'Dell will retire on September 30 after an unprecedented forty-one years on the job. She will leave behind a rich legacy for the citizens of Carol Stream.

In 1962, the Library was started with a collection of 3,500 donated books housed in space shared with the original Village Hall on Blackhawk Drive. Mrs. O'Dell was hired to lead the staff of volunteers in September of 1964. She guided the Library through a period of rapid growth as the population of Carol Stream continued to increase. As the collection swelled to fill the small ranch house, residents enthusiastically supported a referendum to build a new 27,000 square foot building, which was opened in 1978.

During Mrs. O'Dell's tenure, that small collection of donated books has increased to over 173,000 different items, including audiobooks, magazines, sound recordings, video recordings, CD-ROMs, puzzles, and puppets. Circulation continues to increase; last year nearly 370,000 items were checked out.

In 1980, Mrs. O'Dell encouraged the Library Board to enter the "computer age" and join with other libraries to install the first computerized circulation system in the DuPage Library System. Through membership in this consortium, patrons of the Library now have access to a much larger collection than what is housed in their own building. She has continued to expand the reach of the Library beyond its boundaries by promoting interlibrary loan, reciprocal borrowing, and the Library's membership in cooperative cataloging ventures such as OCLC's WorldCat, an online catalog that literally encompasses libraries worldwide.

As the library building approached its twentieth birthday, Mrs. O'Dell recognized that it was beginning to reach its capacity. Because of her careful budgeting, the Library Board was able to afford to convert the unused bookmobile garage into an attractive area to house the magazine collection and a quiet reading area. At the same time, new offices were created for department heads, since the staff had more than doubled from the fewer than twenty who ran the building when it first opened.

Mrs. O'Dell's longevity has been an inspiration to her staff as well. From that first volunteer force of three, the Library now employs over fifty people. One-fourth of current staff members have worked at the Library for more than 10 years.

As Mrs. O'Dell leaves and Assistant Director Ann Kennedy prepares to take the helm, her proudest accomplishment and biggest disappointment concern a new Library building for the citizens of Carol Stream. It's a proud accomplishment because the Board was able to afford to purchase the last open tract of land in the Village to secure a wonderful site for a new building; a disappointment because so far the voters have not recognized the need for that new building. ♦

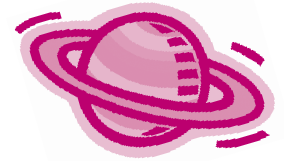
Children ages eight and up are invited to meet and engage in exciting matches with other players the third Saturday of each month. Players should have some knowledge of the game. ♦

Frequently asked questions

Can I renew my items through the Library's Web site?

Yes. Please follow the procedures detailed below. If you have any questions, please contact the Circulation Desk at 653-0755.

- 1) Go to the Library's web site at www.cslibrary.org.
- 2) Click on the Library catalog link.
- 3) Click on the **My Account** tab.
- 4) Type in library card number and PIN (usually the last 4 digits of your home telephone number).
- 5) Click on **login** button. The **Account Overview** page shows number of items checked out, any overdues, fines, etc.
- 6) Click on the **Checked Out** button (located in the blue bar). You will see all of the items you have checked out, their due dates, and whether or not they have been renewed. You are only allowed to renew items one time.
- 7) Check off those items you would like to renew (click in small boxes along the left side of the screen).
- 8) Click on the **Renew** button (located at both the top and bottom of the list of checked out items).
- 9) Scroll down to make sure that items checked were renewed. New due dates should appear in the column along the right-hand side of the screen.
- 10) Remember to **log out** when you are finished renewing items. The **log out** button is located in the upper right hand corner of the screen. ♦
